

Closing statement by Ambassador Munir Akram, at the Virtual 2021 ECOSOC Partnership Forum "Partnership as a Game Changer for a Sustainable Recovery from COVID-19"

May 3, 2021 New York

Excellencies, distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen,

This brings us close to the conclusion of a very interesting discussion.

I think, first of all, in talking about partnerships, I would like to extend my appreciation for the interventions, made by USG Mr. Volker Turk and USG Liu Zhenmin, who have outlined the important role which the United Nations has played in the face of this crisis in building multi-stakeholder partnerships at the country, regional level, and the international level, including, by the Secretary General's timely action to establish the "Recover Better" fund to mobilize emergency responses to so many developing countries and poor people around the world. I think that needs to be noted. We have also had an interesting discussion in insights; CEPI's role in building COVAX, the private sector, search for ESG investment, and the heartening story of the CityPreneurs who have mobilized \$51 billion for projects in urban locations around the world.

We are talking today about an emerging concept which Mr. Wanda mentioned of: Network Multilateralism, which should be guided by inclusiveness, equity, flexibility, transparency. It would be a network multilateralism that could be actualized through the access to new technologies, particularly through digitalization.

And here, I think we have talked about networking within the areas of interest among SDGs, but we could also think about networking, across areas, across regions, and across topics in order to synergize to maximize the benefits of partnership.

It is heartening to see that everyone recognizes the role of the United Nations in being the foundation for such a network multilateral and we welcome the participation of civil society and private sector, and my only disappointment was that the friend from Morgan Stanley, when it came to investment in infrastructure, and sustainable development felt that there was no role for the United Nations. I disagree with that. I believe that the United Nations can play a very helpful role in promoting the environment and the basis for the private sector's larger participation in sustainable investment in developing countries. But this is a concept of the network multilateralism, which is at its genesis, we have learned from the crisis, we should build for a sustainable future for such network multilateralism with the United Nations, at its center.

I thank you all for your contribution, and your participation, and I look forward to working with these partnerships in the future. Thank you very much. This meeting is adjourned.
