# NATIONAL PRACTICES IN STATISTICS OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF INCOME, EXPENDITURE AND WEALTH

- 1. This Addendum to document E/CN.3/399 contains revisions and amendments to Annex I, Tables, of the document.
- 2. The changes in the tables are based on material received by the Statistical Office in response to a request for country comments on the paper. As a dead-line had to be imposed for the completion of the Addendum, not all new material received from the countries could be incorporated. It is, however, planned to issue a final version of the document after the Sixteenth session of the Statistical Commission. In preparing the text, as well as the tables, of the final version of the document, use will be made of all relevant country comments and other materials received.
- 3. In this Addendum, amendments are made to all tables of Annex I of document E/CN.3,399, by adding or removing entries in the original tables on the suggestion of the countries concerned. In addition, supplementary tables are added which include entries for surveys or studies not included in the original version of the tables. Seven tables, namely 4, 7, 11, 15, 18, 22, 23, 24 and 26 were completely revised because of the substantial changes and the considerable amount of additional material that were required.
