of statistical programmes**

Coordination of statistical data collection from countries

Report of the Secretary-General

1. At the request of the Statistical Commission at its thirty-second session,¹ the United Nations Statistics Division sent an inquiry to national statistical offices, requesting them to provide any specific examples that they might have identified of duplication of requests for statistical data by international organizations. The Division sent the inquiry to the 53 countries that attended the thirty-second session of the Commission. Eleven countries replied; summaries of their replies are contained in the annex. The replies were considered by the ACC Subcommittee on Statistical Activities at its thirty-fifth session (Vienna, 18-20 September 2001); lead organizations in the Subcommittee agreed to examine each instance in which a country had reported duplication (see E/CN.3/2002/29, para. 25).

2. Organizations are carrying out the examinations. Some examples of duplication have been confirmed; the involved organizations are looking at possible actions to improve the situation. The Commission will receive an oral report on the issue from the Director of the Division, and a background document will be before the Commission containing reports on as many of the instances cited as possible, as well as observations on some of the issues involved in data collection by the international organizations, particularly coordination to avoid unnecessary duplication.

^b Excludes any information about the supply of bank, monetary, public finance and external trade statistics, which is provided by the People's Bank of China, the Ministry of Finance, the State Administration of Foreign Exchange and the Customs General Administration (which does not imply that there is duplication in those areas); China also provides data to IMF under a special arrangement that might duplicate the statistics listed.

^c Greece referred to a situation in which the same organization requests two or more different national departments for the same data, particularly on agriculture.

^d Hungary also referred to situations in which the same organization sends duplicative requests to countries; in particular, if an organization produces several publications it may request some of the same data for each publication.

^e The United States referred to a situation in which the same organization sends duplicative requests to two people in the Census Bureau.
